




At Normanby Ave, the students produced Pictograms to represent FCS activities.

The children have found many interesting ways to spend their time at the Darebin Parklands on our outings this term. There have been leaf races in streams, rock hopping in the creek and hill rolling. Fairy houses and cubby houses have been constructed from leaves, branches, sticks and flowers that the children have found on the ground.



The parklands have many different places to visit and explore. On one visit, we happened to be sitting near a nesting box when some park rangers came to check its contents. One ranger placed a camera (attached to a long pole)

into the box which produced live images on another ranger's digital tablet. She was able to show us images of the ring-tailed possum that was sleeping inside the nesting box which we were

sitting so close to. After this, the children noticed the multitude of nesting boxes in the park, their differing sizes, and we even saw the backs of a few possums peeking out of some boxes. The rangers explained that as well as possums, they'd seen miniature bats, sugar gliders and several different bird species that day.

There has been a fantastic sense of camaraderie amongst the children in these mixed-aged groups as they spend the day exploring, creating and getting amongst the natural world together.
